Redearth Education is a well established charity registered in 2006 with a local Ugandan partner registered in Uganda in 2009 and based at the Redearth Centre in Masindi District. The local ngo was formed as a result of the work of Redearth Education (UK) and is now transitioning from being led by UK Directors to Ugandan leadership. The organisation remains very much working in partnership with the UK organisation with two boards working together. Staff have been well trained and together we have delivered many successful programs in government schools and early years centres in Uganda over the past 17 years, including the development of a model nursery school where good early years practice can be observed and emulated. We have a deep knowledge and understanding of the context, have strong relationships with local and national government and have a very good reputation for delivery of good quality programs.

Our programs have covered developing good practice in teaching and learning in nursery schools and in primary schools, radio programming, early grade reading and early grade mathematics and headteacher training on leadership amongst others. In these programs we provide central training and ongoing in school support to teachers. We make our training as practically based as possible in order for teachers to understand how they can implement this in their own classrooms and we also train them in making low cost/no cost materials. To support future sustainabilty we have developed a Lead Teacher model whereby the best teachers are trained to support their colleagues.

In addition to this we have provided training and support to other organisations such as RTI and EDC on their national reading programs and have worked alongside Kyambogo University to support the capacity building of tutors. Our latest project will see us supporting the capacity building of early years tutors in four Primary Training Colleges (PTC's)

Whilst our local programs cover all 98 schools with approximately 45,000 children and 900 teachers in Masindi District plus 40 nursery schools, our work has spread to many other districts through the training and support we provide.

We firmly believe in the vital importance of high quality training and high quality teaching and learning. We also believe that high quality early years experiences can set the foundation for children's future success.

TITLE OF WORKSHOP: UNVEILING EXCELLENCE: ENHANCING TEACHER DEVELOPMENT

NAME OF WORKSHOP LEADER: Lynne Pritchard

The workshop is mainly focused on school leaders and others who are responsible for the development of teachers.

This workshop will explore the different kinds of professional development opportunities which headteachers and others can create and promote to improve teaching and learning in their schools. The purpose is to ensure staff are continually learning new skills and improving the outcomes for their pupils.

In the workshop you will explore:

- What the participants feel is working now and how this could be extended into the future.
- The challenges which must be faced
- The current Redearth CPD programs and how these could be further developed to meet needs.

TITLE OF WORKSHOP: Next Steps in Using Phonics: Building on the Foundations

NAME OF WORKSHOP LEADER: Chris Barungi

The workshop is aimed at teachers across all levels, both Nursery and Primary school

Teachers know the basics of phonics: connecting sounds with letters. But what about the tricky parts that can confuse young readers and even us teachers? This workshop dives into advanced phonics, helping educators handle tough sound-to-letter combinations. Participants will learn strategies to help guide children to reading success.

In this workshop, you will:

- Explore additional phonemes in English, including a variety of vowel sounds.
- Engage in activities to use when teaching phonics.
- Take the next steps in learning how to apply advanced phonics in classrooms for the teaching of reading in English.
- Engage in activities which will help you to support learners in developing their reading of more complex words.
- Discuss how Redearth can support you to develop reading skills of your pupils.

TITLE OF WORKSHOP: Write, Wipe, Wow! Using Mini Slates for Learning in Large Classes NAME OF WORKSHOP LEADER: Alex Onyang

This workshop is designed for teachers at any level and will focus on using mini slates to enhance pupil engagement, particularly in large classes.

Participants will discover how mini slates can be an effective strategy for promoting student engagement. When children are engaged, their concentration levels increase, leading to improved behaviour management and increased learning time. You will learn how a simple handheld slate can make a significant difference in your classroom."

The workshop is aimed at classroom teachers in both early years and primary education.

In this interactive workshop participants will learn practical strategies for creating a positive classroom ethos. Through engaging activities and discussions, you'll have the chance to apply and strengthen your understanding of how students can be motivated to make good behaviour choices and enjoy coming to school. This workshop provides valuable insights to create a positive learning environment for all.

In this workshop, you will:

- Discover key ideas for facilitating a positive culture in your classroom.
- Understand the benefits of using positive language use and encouragement with learners.
- Reflect on your personal understanding of class ethos and how you can extend your current practice to support your learners with good behaviour choices.
- Create a trophy that you will take back to your school.
- Consider if there are ways in which you would like further support from Redearth Education in the future.

Martin is currently a Project Leader at Redearth Education. He has worked in Rwanda supporting and mentoring teacher's pedagogical skills and supporting a literacy program. - How math play activities can be organised so that learners have opportunities to extend their skills and understanding, building confidence for future math learning.
- Consider your ideas for how support might be able to support mathematical learning in the future.

TITLE OF WORKSHOP: FROM VISION TO ACTION: BUILDING STRONGER SCHOOLS WITH SUPPORTIVE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEES

It is suggested that in order to learning to read, there are 10 key steps. From 1-10 these are to read, read, read, read, read, read, read, read! However, due to lack of reading materials, children in schools are not able to easily access the world of literature or develop a love of books and reading. Whilst this may be an issue which can only be addressed in small way, this workshop will aim to develop your skills in reading stories to your pupils. It will also enable you to make some very simple small books which you can develop when back in your schools, to build a variety of reading material for your children,

Why reading stories to your children is of prime importance when attempting to
engage children in the reading process
How to fully engage your pupils when reading them a story
Making simple low cost books
